Dear Friends

During May we hit several important Christian days and themes. First on Thursday 9th we have Ascension Day which is always celebrated 40 days after Easter Day. Then 10 days after that we celebrate Pentecost, that being Sunday 19th and the week after that on 26th May is Trinity Sunday when we remember God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Many people, when they think about it all, struggle to understand the concept of a God that is Three in One. Here is one way to begin to unpick this theological nightmare! So, question - why is your television like the Trinity? And a trick question - how many colours does your television set use?

Answer: Just three: red, green and blue. And in that order, just like a rainbow (where reds are at one side, blues at the opposite side, green in the middle). This is known as "RGB". I only hope that our new technologies still use this as my illustration might be void!!

These are TV's three primary colours which, when their luminescence is fired at your eyes, give all the colours of the visible spectrum. These are all "additive" colours. In fact, mix these three together in different proportions, and your screen can offer you 16 million + colours.

You'll soon call out the repair man if your television loses one of its three colours and all the presenters look as though they came from Mars. But change the intensity of any one colour (red, green or blue) even slightly and you change the overall colour.

Switch them all off, and you are left with black. Let all three of them shine at full brightness, at the same point – and then as if by magic you have a totally different colour: WHITE!

It's a parable which illustrates the Holy Trinity. Three completely distinct persons (Father, Son and Holy Spirit), just as your TV set has three quite separate colours: red, green, blue. If you take away any one member of the Trinity, you slip into theological error; take away any one of the three colours, and you call out the TV repair engineer!

So -

It DOES matter that God is our Creator and Father - otherwise our whole life is merely a meaningless illusion.

It DOES matter that Jesus is God the Son, for otherwise his death is simply a human tragedy, with no promise of salvation or eternal life.

It DOES matter that the Holy Spirit is with us here and now, otherwise we are disconnected from God.

Yes it really does matter! Just as it is essential that a TV set can produce white by the equal intensity of all of its three colours. In fact, the more you think about it, the more it seems that the doctrine of the Trinity is far from being a complicated bit of theological nonsense, but is a sort of theological test-card, to make sure that we've got the right picture of God, without distortion.

Do come and worship with us as celebrate all that God brings to our lives and community.



black coffee and Becks beer. Dave Shaylor has been reduced to drinking whisky as Joe cleaned out all the Becks supplies in the area.

For most of Joe's 80 years he has lived in Lasham. and for 53 of them he has been married to Lynn. They have three children. Joanne, John and Catherine, and nine arandchildren. ranging from 21 vear old Christopher to 8 year old Jasmine

Born not far away in West Sussex, he arrived in Lasham via Newcastle, having done an engineering apprenticeship at Fernhurst, a plumbing apprenticeship, and a brief spell working on long pipes for the transference of oil to Fawley as a Lloyds certificated welder, to work for Frank Silvester at Church Farm. In those days the cows were milked in buildings which are now houses in Church Farm Place. When the Silvesters moved to Ropley Joe turned his skills to assist in building their new house, before working for Michael Walford and Dave Shaylor. When the new Lasham dairy was built on the site which had been the sewage works Joe was very much part of the construction team. And he was a crack tractor driver, winning ploughing competitions across the county. From farming Joe joined Mark Smith Plumbing and acquired his Corgi ticket.

Among the many trophies in his house that which takes pride of place is a mounted cricket ball with which he took ELEVEN wickets playing cricket for Lodsworth Cricket Club against Heyshott in 1976. He was a medium fast swing bowler. Not only did Joe play cricket to county level but he was also an ace footballer, a semi-professional for Exeter. As the years went by he became very keen on a Sussex game called stool ball, and no village event was complete without a game of stool ball. For many years Joe organised pool competitions at the Royal Oak - time was when there were two teams, the terror of the neighbourhood, with the A team winning the League!

Not just sports – Joe also excelled in Quiz games and again the Royal Oak benefitted from Joe as he ran regular quiz nights.

Above all Joe is a family man. A devoted and caring husband, a loving and proud father and grandfather.

We wish him many congratulations on his eightieth birthday.

At the end of last year, the Trust was able to make grants totalling £1900 to the following 2023 Grant Award Winners - six young musicians from the area:

• Anna Loadman (Flute) from Peter Symonds College, who was awarded a grant towards the purchase of a new instrument.

• Annabel Cullington-Doss (Viola) also from Peter Symonds College, who is a member of The Royal Academy of Music Junior Department. Annabel was awarded a grant to help cover the cost of her fees.

• Dominik Cramer (Trumpet) who attends The Hurst School, was awarded a grant to cover his instrumental lessons.

• Kian Rosendorf (Double Bass) The Westgate School, Rahel-Sofia Timossi (Violin) The Petersfield School, and Sahar Ghandi (violin) from Henry Beaufort School, were all awarded grants towards the Hampshire County Youth Orchestra residential course at Bryanston.

After the accounts were duly approved by the meeting, Cynthia was presented with a garden centre voucher by the village to stock up their new garden, having recently moved to Odiham. A vote of thanks and a toast was made to her by the Churchwarden followed by a round of applause.

WILD LIFE

Penguins at Birdworld: Last month I mentioned the oldest wild bird on record, a 67 year old Laysan Albatross, Wisdom. She had laid her one and only egg, and when it had hatched, against all odds, the chick survived to fledge. I also mentioned the penguin species you can see at Gilbert White's House Museum (GWHM), but if you want to see live specimens, you should visit Birdworld where more interesting conservation work is currently being carried out.

Birdworld has very similar aims to engage young children and families with the natural world. There are plans to extend the park and continue with planned conservation work. Birdworld attracts over a 100,000 visitors a year and has a conservation and breeding programme for a huge range of birds species, including penguins, flamingoes, parrots, pelicans and other rare species, e.g. the Socorro dove which has been extinct in the wild for almost fifty years. They hope this new species will inspire the next generation.


Plans are afoot to help children interact with animals and birds by creating joint access for Birdworld and the garden centre off a new roundabout on the A325. They also hope to create a new entrance building, play barn, adventure playground, and breeding unit. The old Forest Lodge Garden Centre would be demolished and a new, more energy efficient building constructed in its place.

Conservation work is very important for Birdworld's work and they hope that guests develop an interest in birds so that more effort and funds can be used for conservation. Seventy per cent of Birdworld's collection is dedicated to species conservation and there are plans for this to continue in the future, so that eventually some species can be returned to the wild. This commitment is taken extremely seriously so every opportunity will be taken to protect and support wildlife. There are also plans to install an area for bats.

This is a very exciting development proposed for the site. Many of the old buildings are showing their age and need to be replaced. Hopefully this work will begin in 2025, subject to planning approval by EHDC.

Verges: As long as residents can refrain from cutting roadside verges, they will continue to blossom and bloom. We can now see *anemones* growing wild on some verges in our

villages, both white and purple plants looking spectacular. Another plant that appears to be springing up is the Snakeshead Fritillary, also a very good source of nectar for bees. I have never grown them purposely, but they tend to appear amongst my Hellebore plants.



Hinton Ampner (N.T. property): You will find an inspirational *display of spring bulbs* at Hinton Ampner this year, including a carpet of Snakeshead Fritillary beneath blossom trees. If you wish to purchase a few, visit the garden shop. Also on display you will find plants and trees for a vegetable and fruit garden. I have made space in my garden for a

few fruit bushes, gooseberries, raspberries and black currants. I have planted artichokes and a couple of rhubarb plants in between.

NGS open gardens: If you visit a nursery or garden centre, be sure to pick up your free guide to National Garden Scheme open gardens for Hampshire and the IOW. There are some spectacular gardens open during May, including



Bluebell Wood, Bere Mill and Little Court to mention but a few. Visit ngs.org.uk and view gardens you can visit this year. As the organiser says, this is described as 'Britain's Best Value Day Out'. One of the key messages for the NGS is, 'Great Gardens, Great Cake, Great Causes'.

Bourne Conservation Group: I mentioned the Newton Valence toad patrol last month. Not to be outdone a volunteer toad patrol group were also out and about in February and early March rescuing amphibians making their way on Boundary Road, Rowledge. The number of toads, frogs and newts rescued this year surpassed last year's numbers, and set a record of 719 toads this year. Volunteers feel that because we have warmer, wetter winters in this country, toads are making their trip to their breeding ponds earlier. We will have to wait for Froglife to look at the numbers for the south of England before we know whether this is a trend that might continue.





The Easter weekend proved to be sunny and warm, and the bees were very active so I turned the mouse guards round 90° so that they

have a slot as an entrance, instead of holes. This allows more movement in and out while still providing some protection from the elements and desperate rodents. It's still a little chilly to open the hives and it's difficult to predict a big enough gap in the rain. I need to do it soon though, as the bees are collecting nectar and I don't want them to think there isn't enough space to store it. If they do this, they will start preparations for swarming, which I don't want. So much depends on the weather, I must keep one step ahead all the time. There may be a gap on Saturday. I need at least an hour, possibly two, to inspect the 3 hives and put honey supers on the top of each hive, above the one super they have already. The extra supers have been inside the garage over winter. Although they have been sealed there is a risk that wax moth may have got in, but I had treated them against this so hopefully they will be OK.

Please be on the lookout for Asian Hornets. These are an invasive species and are deadly for honey bees. They have bright yellow legs, mostly black body except for the fourth abdominal segment which has a yellow band. Sightings must be reported. You can do that here https://www.nationalbeeunit.com/diseases-and-pests/asian-hornet/#



By the time you read this, the weather may have improved enough for the swarm season to start. So please keep an eye out and let me know if you see one. I'm happy to come and remove if they are posing a danger or nuisance but as all my hives are full, I won't come if they are not in the way, or the swarm is too small. COUNTRY MATTERS

May 2024 – Lambing begins earlier than expected.

The grey and wet weather continues so just a few notes to quantify how wet. **Exactly the same words to begin as the April article**. The rainfall total for March was 134.5 mm (5.5 ins) which takes the rolling 12 month to 1272 mm (51.5ins). The numbers have hardly changed into April and it seems that every day it rains but to repeat last month's words the weather is cyclical and logic suggests that before long wonderful dry and sunny weather will appear for a long spell. I do hope so.

My second paragraph last month began by predicting that lambing would commence around the 14th April – well I got that wrong! On the 3rd April I was checking the ewes for a final time before leaving for a meeting in London and noticed that one ewe had some slime and fluids beginning to show – lambing was about to begin. London was cancelled and I pulled out 2 healthy lambs – a good result. After the second lamb I checked to make sure that there was not a third lamb still inside and could not feel anything solid – just lots of fluids and membranes which is normal. However about an hour later a third small lamb appeared – sack the shepherd! All 3 are doing well and have been ringed for castration (where necessary) and to remove their tails. The rings are rubber bands that slowly reduce the blood supply until the testicles and tails fall off a couple of weeks later. If you put a ring on your finger it is not painful as it is not tight. This is a much better method than other methods of castration and tail removal used in the past – hot pinchers. The males are castrated because they become sexually mature at about 6 months of age which in a mixed sex group causes obvious problems. They also have a different (obviously) set of hormones which results in their meat tasting quite strongly and also the body shape is different – a ram will have more weight to the shoulders where the meat cuts are not so good. The tails are removed because when eating fresh spring grass the lambs tend to poop a lot and if they have long tails it all becomes very messy – much better for it to fall to the floor. Poopy tails become very attractive to flies which then lay eggs which develop into maggots which is horrible.

This first family have now moved into a paddock and will soon be joined by other families – a set of twins arrived safely this morning despite the torrential rain during the night. Temperatures in April are higher and it is the cold that kills lambs. The critical management operation is to make sure that the lambs receive colostrum which is full of antibodies from the mother's milk within an hour or so of birth. By the time the lambs are about 3 hours old they are not able to absorb the antibodies so that first intake of milk in the form of colostrum is critical to a good start for them.

The sheep markets are at record highs because fewer are being produced or reaching the UK market at present for a number of reasons:-

- the trade war between Australia and China has cooled so more Oz lamb is going to China
- the middle East conflict has closed the Red Sea to most shipping and therefore the boats need to the long way around Africa which costs more and takes longer
- there is an increasing demand from different religions within the UK for lamb to be eaten at various festivals – Easter(as always), Eid etc
- lamb production is currently declining in the UK a previous lack of profitability and a reduction in those willing (sheep farmers/ shepherds) to work the long hours to raise lambs
- the restrictions in sheep numbers imposed in some areas by Natural England, National Park authorities, the Environment Agency
- a reduction in sheep farming in New Zealand because of a lack of profitability

The recent farmer protests have received publicity recently because of low prices. What is really dispiriting is the many protocols that UK farmers adhere to and the carefully controlled UK production methods (for good reason) do not apply to some imported foods. Imported food that you are eating is often produced using methods that if used here would result in the producer being charged and fined or imprisoned - how can that be right?? Some examples of imported foods produced <u>that do not meet UK standards</u> are:-

- animal welfare standards e.g. sow stalls banned first in UK still used in much of the world including parts of EU – restrict the ability of sows to move – but pork still comes here from countries that use stalls
- UK hens have a much larger living area than those produced elsewhere
- damaging insecticides applied to crops oilseed grown outside the UK and EU
- fungicides used to grow wheat eastern Europe outside the EU, US and Canada
- energy used to transport food to the UK is that taken into account when assessing UK production
- the routine use of antibiotics in chicken diets to speed growth rates

- BST used in US milk production banned in EU, Canada and other countries
- the felling of forest land to grow palm oil and other crops such as wheat in Indonesia and South America
- ractopamine used as a growth promoter for beef and pork in the US, Canada and Brazil – but banned in 160 countries including the UK, EU, China, Taiwan and Russia because it is possibly carcinogenic

Finally for those of you with mobile phones – look at the Merlin app (there are other similar apps) that enable you to identify birdsong within earshot. Just turn on the app in a quiet area and you will be amazed at the number of different species that are busy in the countryside where we live. This week my phone has identified the following species Chaffinch, Blackbird, Thrush, Green Woodpecker, Nuthatch, Yellowhammer, Wren, Great Tit, Green Finch, Skylark, Marsh Tit, Chiffchaff, Firecrest, Sparrow and Robins plus crows, Jackdaws etc.




